Critter Comforters has been supplying blankets to Napa County Animal Shelter for 8 years. NVDTC supplies the labels and volunteers sew,



knit or crochet blankets that go home with each dog and cat adopted from the shelter. Total production to-date is approximately 4,000 blankets.

We are hoping to find one or two new volunteers



Critter Comforters now has a working relationship with Community Projects thrift shop to receive flannel, fleece and mattress pads that are not quite good enough to sell in the store. As a result of that generosity, we have a huge backlog of fabric goods and only two volunteers sewing blankets.

A wonderful lady who has been sewing 12-15 blankets each and every week since Critter Comforters started is now in her 90s. She is still active and producing blankets, but when she can no longer sew for us, we will need someone (or more likely, several someones) to take over her production.

Interested persons can call Gwenn McKenzie at 255-3578 for more information. Gwenn receives, launders and sorts the fabric, and distributes labels, but her sewing skills are nonexistent. Volunteers work at their own pace on their own schedules.



Are You Guilty of These Dog Park Faux Pas?

Most people love the idea of dog parks -dogs playing together in harmony, and running through endless fields of lush foliage. But then again sometimes that's not

exactly how it works. Many times our pets become the brunt of a dog bully, or even worse our dog acts like the bully. While it's easy to turn a blind eve and just let dogs play, it's important to keep other pet parents in mind when we take our pups to the park.

Be a Mindful Pet Parent

Many pet parents will tell you that they can't stand it when a pet parent pays no attention to their pooch. This allows for dog fights to happen easily. Just like humans, dogs won't get along with "everyone" they meet, therefore you must make sure your dog is treating others well. If you see some aggression and your dog is involved take him or her out of the situation immediately. It's also good etiquette to apologize to the other pet parent. The bottom line is, don't be oblivious to what's going on with your pet.

Don't Scold Other Peoples' Pets

When you see someone else's dog acting up it may be a basic instinct to scold that dog. However, you shouldn't try to reprimand anyone's dog but your own. Many pet parents take offense to other people yelling or warning their pet. Calmly walk over to the other pet parent and let them know their pet isn't playing by the rules. Pet parents will react better if you talk to them and not Fido.

Leave the Attitude at Home

We all want our dog to have other dog friends and have a great time at the park, but the fact is, some dogs just can't play nice with each other. Dominant dogs like to be in control of others, and if your dog is dominant and he or she meets another dominant dog, then many times there will be an issue. That's why you must always keep an eye on your pet, and if need be, keep him or her on a leash for a while. If your pet is still having issues after the first couple of visits, it might be a good idea to play elsewhere.

Truth be told, not all dogs are cut out for the dog park. If we do go to the dog park, just remember it's our job as dog parents to make sure our playful pooch is behaving. If we listen to others at the dog park, pay attention to our dogs, and communicate well with other pet parents, surely a good time will be had by all.



New AKC "Community Canine" Title

Giving responsible dog owners a whole new level of achievement for their dogs, the American Kennel Club®



(AKC®) has developed a new advanced level title - AKC Community Canine as part of the Canine Good Citizen® (CGC®) training program. Since 1989, the CGC program has rewarded more than 600,000 dogs and their owners who have passed the test, which recognizes the dogs' good manners at home and in the community.

With the introduction of AKC Community Canine, the AKC's CGC program now provides a compre-

hensive three- level training program for you and your dog. Beginning with AKC S.T.A.R. Puppy, progressing to Canine Good Citizen and now to AKC Community Canine, the CGC program trains dogs through all stages of life to be well behaved in society.

"AKC Community Canine expands on CGC skills and lays the beginning foundation for obedience, rally and therapy dog work," Director of the Canine Good Citizen program Mary Burch, PhD, said. "While Canine Good Citizen tests are simulations of real world skills, the goal of AKC Community Canine is to test the dog's abilities in

a natural setting. Rather than the test being administered in a ring, certain elements will involve the dog walking through a real crowd, whether at a dog show or on a busy sidewalk."

As with CGC, AKC Community Canine requires a 10-step test of skills that dogs must pass to earn the official AKC Community Canine title:

- Dog sits or lies down and waits under control
- Walks on a loose leash in a natural situation (not in a ring) and does not pull
- Walks on a loose leash through a crowd
- Dog walks past distraction dogs present and does not pull
- Sit-stay in small group (3 other people with dogs)
- Dog allows person who is carrying something to approach and pet it
- Dog walks by food and follows owner instructions, "Leave it"
- Down or sit stay-distance (owner's choice)
- Recall (coming when called) with distractions present
- Dog will enter/exit a doorway or passageway with owner and remain under control

Eligible dogs for the AKC Community Canine title must have a CGC certificate or title on record at AKC and must have an AKC number (AKC registration number, PAL number, or AKC Canine Partners number). Dogs passing the AKC Community Canine test will earn the "CGCA" (advanced CGC) title.

Instructors can learn more about the program and begin training their students on AKC Community Canine skills by visiting the AKC Community Canine page. Beginning last October, AKC Community Canine testing is now administered by approved AKC CGC evaluators nationwide.

Carob Crunchers: A little carob love for a wheat sensitive doggy.

1 cup White Rice Flour

1/2 cup Carob Powder

1 teaspoon Cinnamon

1 teaspoon Vanilla Extract

3/4 cup Water

- 1. Preheat oven to 350 degrees Fahrenheit and line a baking sheet with parchment paper or a silicone baking mat.
- 2. Mix all ingredients in a large bowl and knead until dough is formed and smooth, you may need to add

- a little more water as the dough tends to be on the dry side.
- 3. Roll onto a heavily floured surface 1/4 inch thick and cut with small cookie cutter of your choice. Place on prepared baking sheet.
- 4. Bake for 10 to 15 minutes or the cookies start to crackle. Cool and refrigerate.

Tips: Make sure you knead the dough very well, it may take some work to get the dough to come together. To make it easy on yourself it might be better to just cut it into squares with a pizza cutter.
