# **Pet-Friendly Fourth of July Tips**

As we prepare for barbecues and fireworks this Fourth of July, The American Kennel Club, a not-for-profit organization which maintains the largest registry of purebred dogs in the world, offers tips on how to keep your pets safe and calm during this Independence Day.

It is safer to keep your pets at home during Fourth of July celebrations instead of bringing him to your neighbor's party. Keep your pets in the house, rather than in your yard. He will be a lot happier indoors, and not tempted to leap over a fence to find you.

Dogs can be startled by the loud noise of fireworks. Once the festivities begin, keep your pet in a safe room where he can feel comfortable. If he is crate trained put him in his crate covered with a blanket to make him feel secure.

Block outside sights and sounds by lowering the blinds and turning on the television. Play soothing music in the background to counteract the cacophony during the

"rockets' red glare.

If your pet seems overly anxious, spend some time with your pet, speaking soothingly to help them to relax. Avoid scraps from the grill. While tempting to our pets, any sudden change to your pets' diet can cause stomach upset. In addition, some certain foods like onions, avocado, grapes and raisins can be toxic.

Human products can be dangerous to animals. Avoid spraying your pet with insect repellent and only use special sunscreen that is intended for animal use. Keep your pets away from matches and lighter fluid. They can be extremely irritating to the stomach, lungs and central nervous system, if ingested.

Should your dog get scared, escape and run away, help find him with microchip identification. Collars and tags can fall off so make sure you have permanent ID with a microchip. Keep contact information current with your recovery service provider. For more information and to enroll your pet in a 24 hour recovery service visit www.akccar.org.

# AKC S.T.A.R. Puppy Program

The AKC S.T.A.R. Puppy<sup>sm</sup> Program is an incentive program for loving dog owners who have taken the time to take their puppies through a basic training class.

#### The Benefits of Training

Training classes teach you how to best communicate with your puppy. Organized training classes also provide an opportunity for your dog to socialize with other dogs. In classes aimed at earning the AKC S.T.A.R. Puppy distinction, you'll be able to get information on all of your puppy-raising questions including housetraining, chewing, and the most effective way to teach practical skills such as coming when called. AKC S.T.A.R. Puppy training is a natural lead in to the AKC® Canine Good Citizen® Program.

#### How It Works

When you complete a basic training class (taught by an AKC Approved CGC Evaluator) with your puppy (up to 1 year old) your puppy is eligible to be enrolled in the AKC S.T.A.R. Puppy Program.

You'll attend any puppy or basic training class at least 6 weeks. Your instructor will administer the AKC S.T.A.R. Puppy test at the end of the course. 


### **IX. NEW BUSINESS**

### **Canine Safety for Kids**

- Always ask a dog's owner if you may pet the dog. Some dogs shouldn't be touched. He may be "on duty" as an assistance or service dog, or he may be injured, ill, or afraid of children.
- Approach a dog from the front or side-not from behind. Hold your hands low and speak softly. Do not surprise a dog, force him into a corner, wave your hands in the air or scream at her.
- If there's one place a dog may get defensive, it's at the food dish. Your dog should not growl when you get near his dish, but don't interfere when a dog is eating.
- Some dogs are very protective of their balls or chew toys.
  Never take a bone or toy from a dog's mouth unless he's trained to drop it or give it to you.
- Avoid teasing, rough wrestling, or tug-of-war games. Dogs may get too enthusiastic in these sorts of games and forget you are not a dog. Fetch, frisbee, agility, and flyball are better outlets for your dog's energy.
- Respect a dog's space. Dogs naturally defend their territo-

ries. Do not stick your hand inside a strange dog's pen or car window. A dog may feel afraid and may react to protect himself or his territory.

- Never try to break up a dogfight. While most fights end
  - quickly, call an adult for help. Trying to separate fighting dogs or yelling at them may make them more excited, and they might turn on you or accidentally bite you.
  - Observe canine body language. Beware of a dog that is barking, growling, or showing his teeth. Stay away if his ears are back, tail is up, or his hair is standing up on his back. Say "NO" firmly and slowly walk away with your arms by your side. Do not scream, stare into his eyes, or run away.
  - Tell your friends what you know.

When friends come to your house, introduce them to your dog and explain the house rules.

• Share your knowledge. The more everyone knows about dogs, the better world it will be for dogs and people.
